because of you. Thank you.**



Values in Action



CELEBRATING INNOVATION AND TEAMWORK: — ANNUAL TREE HOUSE AWARDS —

We are proud to showcase the talents and contributions of Tree House staff teams. Nominated by their colleagues, these honorees have gone above and beyond to model innovation and uplift our community of caregivers.



ROOKIE OF THE YEAR: *Michelle Nolan*

Michelle joined Tree House in 2022, serving as a cat care volunteer for nearly two years before joining our staff as a cat care technician. From the beginning, her enthusiastic, warm, and brilliant personality made a clear impact on our cats and people. “Michelle learned the ropes of caregiving quickly and brought innovative ideas to our team, friendliness to everyone in the building, and a willingness to jump in to support the team,” praises her nominator. Thanks to Michelle’s presence and initiative, the adoption floor storage cabinets now boast an efficient organization system, while the cat colonies are filled with her infectious laughter.

BIG BANG AWARD FOR INNOVATION: *Shelter Staff*

The Shelter Staff crew is one of the mightiest at Tree House, both in size and impact. From caretakers to adoption counselors and more, shelter staff interact with dozens of cats and people each day, and they know how to make every moment count. “Creating the daily cat health and behavior observation trackers, plus implementing open adoption walk-ins, were huge innovation moments for cat care and customer service staff. These processes, and many more, led to better matches, thriving cats, and happy adopters,” boasts their nominator. In a true team effort, shelter staff prioritize collaboration and welcome fresh perspectives to improve service for our cats and community.



RIPPLE EFFECT AWARD: *Community Programs Staff*

Through every season, Community Programs staff show up in neighborhoods across Chicagoland with pop-up clinics, education events, pet food pantry supplies, and hands-on shelter builds. Their steadfast pursuit of growth has brought programs and resources to hundreds of pet owners and caretakers. “By creating opportunities for meaningful partnerships, enriching lives through education, and expanding our reach, Community Programs have set the stage for future growth and positive change at Tree House,” says their nominator. Their commitment to forging new relationships and expanding our reach inspires a culture of innovation across Tree House.



DARE TO TRY AWARD: *Event Staff (Marketing, Administration, and Development)*

Composed of team members from marketing, administration, and development, Event Staff set out to revamp Tree House’s event strategy with the debut of City Kitty Soirée. While it did not meet every expectation, their fearlessness, innovative problem-solving, and commitment to the challenge earned them the Dare to Try Award. “(For City Kitty Soiree), our Event Staff tried a new venue and format, executed the event well, and adapted as needed throughout the process. Most importantly, they demonstrated what a high-functioning team looks like – supporting each other, staying solutions-focused, and maintaining a shared commitment to success,” praises their nominator.



SERVICE LEADER AWARD: *Samantha Alspaugh*

Samantha found her way back to Tree House after several years, returning with outstanding leadership and project management expertise to support hundreds of fosters at Tree House. “Sam has gone above and beyond to educate and empower our community of foster caregivers through her informative tutorials on neonate care, medication administration, and individualized support to each foster volunteer has built confidence and a sense of community,” remarks her nominator. Sam’s enthusiasm for learning and stewardship informs her innovative service to both our foster volunteers and the cats in their care.

= HOME IS WORTH THE WAIT: CASSIUS'S JOURNEY TO BELONGING =

At Tree House, we believe every cat deserves the chance to grow, thrive, and find a home where they are truly seen, nurtured, and supported.

For Cassius, a spirited and often misunderstood cat who spent over two years in our care, this opportunity to be seen for who he truly is—and to finally find a loving home—made all the difference.


Cassius arrived at Tree House from Chicago Animal Care and Control in February 2023 with little known about his past. However, it quickly became clear that he was full of energy and needed a thoughtful, individualized approach to help him adjust to his new surroundings. He struggled with social boundaries and would

often become overstimulated during human interactions, requiring regular and engaging playtime to redirect his abundant energy in appropriate ways. Although Cassius was adopted early on, he was soon returned when it became evident that his unique needs required more time and experience to understand.

Though his return was disheartening, it allowed us to refine the work we had begun. With the expertise of our feline behaviorist, Erin Mayes, Cassius blossomed. Our devoted staff and volunteers established a consistent routine that included providing enrichment activities, hosting one-on-one play sessions, and setting clear boundaries. This process helped Cassius build trust, become more confident in expressing himself, and develop healthier behaviors. Gradually, the once unpredictable cat began to reveal his affectionate nature.

By November 2024, Cassius had settled into a new foster home, where the calm, supportive, and well-structured environment helped him feel increasingly at ease. Over time, his foster family came to truly appreciate his personality and everything that made him who he is. As their connection deepened, it became clear that Cassius had found more than just a temporary place to decompress and channel his liveliness. In March 2025, they officially adopted him, fully embracing his quirks and offering the patience and love he needed to thrive.

Cassius's story is a powerful reminder that every cat follows its own unique path, and sometimes it takes a little longer for the right match to come along. Cassius is deeply loved and living a full, joyful, and exuberant life—a testament to the power of second (and even third) chances and the unwavering belief in the value of every cat.



Cassius's story reminds us that the right family is always worth the wait—but we're hoping Korra doesn't have to wait as long.

Korra came to Tree House nearly a year ago from Chicago Animal Care and Control. At nine years old, she's a senior cat with a strong sense of self. Affectionate on her terms, she'll nuzzle in when she's ready—and retreat when she's not.

Korra may not be the classic cuddler, but that's what makes her special. She knows what she likes, and she's still open to love and growth.

She's not just looking for a home—she's looking for someone who sees her fully and loves her for exactly who she is.

TEAM TOUCHPOINTS: TV screens display team highlights, and custom buttons let staff wear their values proudly.


Looking Ahead

= THE LOVE THAT LETS GO: HONORING NELSON AND BARTHOLOMEW =



Nelson and Bartholomew couldn't have been more different. Nelson arrived the day after Christmas—plump, confident, and clearly used to home life. Bartholomew came a month later, ragged and cautious, shaped by the streets. But despite their contrasting paths, they shared one powerful truth: both were deeply, unconditionally loved by their Tree House family. And when the time came to say goodbye, each was met with that same love—held gently, cared for tenderly, and given peace in their final moments.

Bartholomew spent his early days pretending to sleep in the back of his acclimation cage, too scared to explore. Once he finally braved the first step out for a squeeze treat, the change was instant—he purred, head-booped everything in reach, charming everyone with his soulful eyes and earnest desire for scratches. Though he spent periods of time on our adoption floor, Bartholomew spent most of his time in foster care. His journey included tumor removal, hernia repair, spinal issues, severe allergies, partial paralysis, diabetes, and eventually, an aggressive cancer. Despite his long list of ailments, Bartholomew's heart-melting sweetness never wavered. With his big, human-like eyes, he let us know he felt safe and loved. When the time came to help him pass peacefully, he left this world with the same



quiet grace he brought to every day—and left a lasting imprint on all who cared for him.

Nelson found his way to our Foster Program to work through allergy issues, and though his skin was itchy and raw, every photo of him shared was the very image of a cat living his best life. Returning to our adoption floor a month later, his love of lap time made him a favorite among staff and volunteers. Sitting with Nelson was a grounding experience, thanks both to his size and peaceful nature. Months later, Nelson was sadly diagnosed with very advanced heart disease. Bathed in soft sun and given every comfort—fresh laps of water, warm places to rest—Nelson spent his last months wrapped in love, until the time came to say goodbye.

Their final chapters were written with the same compassion that defined their lives at Tree House. When it became clear that continued treatment would only prolong suffering, we made the difficult but loving decision to say goodbye. Humane euthanasia, while heartbreak, is an essential part of our work. It's not about giving up—it's about giving peace.



After a decade in animal welfare, saying goodbye hasn't gotten easier for me. Even now, just writing about these two boys still brings tears to my eyes. Even so, dignity in death is part of what it means to provide truly compassionate care. It's the final gift we can offer to animals who gave so much of themselves while with us. Through our Veterinary Wellness Center, our support extends beyond the animals in our shelter, offering compassionate care services to pet owners and caregivers in the community. We ensure every cat thrives, right up to the end, even when it means letting go.


Nelson and Bartholomew gave us comfort, laughter, and affection, and when the time came, we returned that same compassion, trust, and love as we said goodbye. We are grateful to have known them, and we honor their memory by continuing to offer every cat the dignity they deserve.


#ChicagoPubs



Charlie Brown may be new to indoor life, but he's already obsessed! From the fridge to the dishwasher, every discovery is an adventure.




